

How to get to Limerick

TRAVELLING FROM THE AIRPORT

From Dublin Airport, you have a couple of options. The most direct option is Eireagle, which will cost \in 18.50, and the cheapest option would be to take the Dublin Coach which leaves from the airport once per hour and goes to the Red Cow, where you will change to the M7 Express Service which will go to Limerick. The cost of this will be \in 20 if you book <u>online</u>, or \in 25 to get a ticket at the bus. You can ask at the airport for the 'Dublin Coach' or the 'Green Bus' and you should be able to find it. There are other options such as J.J. Kavanagh & Sons, but these tend to be more expensive. A taxi for this journey could cost anywhere from \in 300 to \in 350.

Dublin airport is also the headquarters of Ryanair and Aer Lingus, which means affordable flights to destinations in Europe and around the world. Ryanair makes it especially easy to reach most places in Europe for a weekend getaway at an affordable cost.

From Shannon Airport, you can get the Bus Eireann <u>Bus 343</u> from the airport to the city. A taxi for this route would cost approximately €50. Shannon Airport is the nearest airport to Cook at just 20-30 minutes away. The airport handles over 1.7 million passengers per year and flies to a vast number of global destinations.

You can also rent cars at either Shannon or Dublin airports if you prefer to drive yourself.



Getting set up

OPENING A BANK ACCOUNT

An essential first step when you get to Ireland is opening your bank account. You will need to fill in an application and provide proof of identity and proof of address. The ID can be in the form of a passport, driving license, or EU national identity card. Proof of address should be a recent utility bill (under 6 months old) or correspondence from a government authority. Cook will provide you a letter in place of your proof of address.

In most cases, you will have to carry out the opening of the account in person, but you may begin the application process online. Sometimes it is possible to do it by post with certified copies of your documentation. It is simpler if you already have an Irish address, but if you don't it is possible to open an account as a non-resident and use proof of your foreign address. Some popular banks in Ireland (including their helplines) are:

There are many international banks, so your bank at home may have a branch in Ireland. Make sure to check all of the details when researching and choosing an account, as many charge fees unless you keep your balance at a certain level, and some even charge you per transaction.

PERSONAL PUBLIC SERVICE (PPS) NUMBER

Your Personal Public Service (PPS) number is a unique reference number that helps you access social welfare benefits, public services, and information in Ireland. Allocation is done by face-toface interview. However, if you are moving to Ireland you can book an appointment for a PPS number allocation interview before you arrive. You should visit the <u>PPS Number Allocation Centre</u> in the county that you intend to live. Before you can be allocated a PPS number, you must show that <u>one is required for</u> <u>a transaction with a specified body</u>.

You will be asked to produce proof of identity and address in Ireland. Cook will provide a letter to assist if you do not have an address in Ireland yet. Different documentation will be required, depending on your nationality. A complete list of documents required as proof of your identity is <u>available here</u>.

TAX CREDITS

What are tax credits?


Tax credits reduce the amount of tax you pay on your earnings. Everyone is entitled to Personal Tax Credits. The specific amount of tax credit each individual receives is determined through set criteria used by the Inland Revenue and will depend on personal circumstances. Only when you have received your PPS number will you be able to register online with the Inland Revenue through these steps:

Step 1: Login to <u>www.revenue.ie</u>.

Step 2: Register my account - you will need your PPS number for this. Your password will then be sent to the address provided within 3 to 4 days. Note: The address used when applying for a PPS number has to be the same one used when registering your details on www.revenue.ie. This temporary password will expire after 21 days.

Step 3: Once you have your password you can log back into <u>Revenue</u>. Go to the Jobs and Pension Service section and enter your employer information - Company Registration number (**Cook Ireland Ltd. 8203176O**), commencement work date and employee number. A Tax Cert confirming tax credit information will then be sent to Cook and the employee within 48 hours. The new tax credit information will subsequently be uploaded into Cook's payroll system.





Accommodation

WHERE TO FIND ACCOMMODATION

Castletroy is a great place to live and is very close to Cook's offices. Along with regular rental properties, it is known for its student accommodation. This is good if you don't mind lots of student activity because these houses tend to be less expensive to rent. Some of the large student accommodation areas in Castletroy include Milford Grange, Elm Park, and College Court.

Some more residential areas include Annacotty and Monaleen. These are a little further from Cook, but are no more than a five-minute drive away and are accessible by bus. These tend to be less popular with students due to their distance from the university, and so they are a good option for peaceful living.

Some of our employees prefer to live in Limerick city and there is a bus service from the city to Castletroy or you might be able to arrange a lift with one of your new colleagues.

ACCOMMODATION COST

Did you know the average cost of renting a threebed house in Ireland is \in 1,344 per month? Here in Limerick and the greater Mid-West region, the average monthly rent is \in 1,828 in the city, and as low as \in 1,642.26 when you move outside the city.

Some typical costs you might incur as a tenant may include these:



Transportation

Limerick is proud to be Ireland's demonstration city in terms of introducing and trialling new smart travel initiatives. This means that for walking, cycling, and shared travel, Limerick is always looking for ways to become more efficient and environmentally friendly. Limerick is one of the unique cities in Ireland where you can easily get by without needing to own a car. As a relatively small city, most places are reachable by foot or bike, and almost everywhere is reachable by bus. As mentioned below, there are plenty of ways to get around Limerick without a car.

If you do need to buy a car, then you can find a second-hand car on the internet. You can also purchase a second-hand car from the many car dealerships around the country. However, make sure you get some advice from someone who knows about cars before you purchase.

TRAINS

Trains are a great option for travelling to other cities in comfort. Limerick's Colbert station can connect you to any of the other major cities in Ireland. Check the website <u>here</u> for more information.

BUSES

You can travel almost anywhere you need to go in Limerick and surrounding areas by bus. Bus Eireann provides a comprehensive service around the city and surrounding areas, and also to nearby cities. Bus Eireann also operate a bus stop just beside our location in Castletroy, meaning you can get from Cook to the city in no time!

There are other bus companies, such as Dublin Coach and JJ Kavanagh, that also provide services around the city and further afield to Dublin, Cork, Galway, Tralee, and more.

If you plan to be using the bus a lot, then it is worth your while to get a <u>Leap Card</u>. This is a card that you can top up, and it will allow you to pay for your bus fare without needing cash. Users of a Leap Card will also receive a discount of up to 30%.

Healthcare in Ireland

PUBLIC HEALTHCARE

Public hospitals in Ireland are owned and funded by the <u>Health Service Executive</u> (HSE) or are voluntary public hospitals, which may be privately operated but funded by the government.

Anybody who is classified as 'ordinarily resident' in Ireland (intending to live in Ireland for a year or more) has access to publicly funded healthcare. However, employees should note that public healthcare in Ireland is not completely free of charge. Some treatments require a subsidised fee for patients who don't have a medical card, which is allocated according to an individual's income, age, illness, and/or disability.

Nationals of European Union countries with a <u>European Health Insurance Card</u> have access to free or discounted emergency care in public facilities in Ireland.

PRIVATE HEALTHCARE

Private hospitals in Ireland operate independently of the state. Private healthcare can also be provided in public hospitals through the designation of private beds. Patients who opt for private healthcare in public facilities are required to pay for all hospital services as well as doctors' fees.

HEALTH INSURANCE

If you don't qualify for a medical card, the Irish government provides other options for obtaining free or subsidised care, such as GP visit cards and the long-term illness scheme.

New employees should know that at Cook, we have a partnership with <u>Laya Healthcare</u>. Cook covers the cost of Laya membership for each employee, and their immediate family, who has over 6 months' service. This means that our employees can avail themselves of a multitude of benefits. Some of these benefits include:

- Access to the Laya Employee Assistance.
 Program, which includes: counselling service, financial information, legal information, career information, consumer information, career guidance, life coaching, mediation, relocation support services, health information, day-to-day practical advice, and an online portal with on-demand access to the above services and information.
- Up to 35% off an annual multi-trip policy
- Regular well-being bulletins for members
- Fitness seminars as part of the 'thrive health and fitness' initiative

When you arrive, it is definitely worth asking about the Laya Healthcare coverage at Cook.

MEDICINES AND PHARMACIES

Pharmacies are widely available. Some areas do not have 24-hour pharmacies, but they may have pharmacies that stay open late. Prescription medications are provided free of charge to those with a medical card.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

Public and private hospitals have Accident and Emergency (A&E) departments for serious emergencies. Dial 999 or 112 for an ambulance in an emergency. Patients without a medical card or a referral by a GP will be charged for A&E services.

GENERAL PRACTITIONERS (GPs)

See <u>this list</u> for the contact details of GPs in Limerick. GPs treat all common medical conditions, and they refer patients to hospitals and other services for urgent and specialist treatment. Employees also get the benefit getting 50% back on the cost of GP visits with our Laya Healthcare plan.





EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM

If you are coming to Limerick to further your career, you are in the right place. Along with enhancing your career through the excellent training provided by Cook, there are excellent opportunities for postgraduate education on a part-time basis.

Cook provides great educational assistance for employees who wish to take part in programs that are relevant to their role. These are run by institutions across Ireland.

Cook also provides a multitude of re-skilling and up-skilling opportunities to our employees through our 'My Cook Pathway' initiative. This gives our employees the opportunity to gain additional educational qualifications to help further their career with Cook. 
LIMERICK'S EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

Polish is by far the most common language spoken by foreign nationals, followed by French, Romanian, and Lithuanian.

CINEMA, LIVE SHOWS, AND THEATRE

WILD ATLANTIC WAY

Have you ever heard of the Wild Atlantic Way? Living in the Mid-West, you are at one of the main gateways to arguably one of Europe's most scenic and breathtaking driving routes. This is definitely worth exploring during your time in Limerick.

Ireland's Wild Atlantic Way is essentially a 2,500 kilometre drive along Ireland's west coast, offering

some of the most amazing views in the country and arguably, Europe! In just one day, you can drive north to Donegal or south to Cork and still make it home before bedtime, but we strongly recommend you don't plan to see it all in one day.

You could easily spend days or even weeks exploring Ireland's beautiful west coast. From the breathtaking Cliffs of Moher just an hour from Limerick, to the tallest mountain in Ireland, Carrauntoohil in Kerry, or up to the highest cliffs in Europe at Slieve League in Donegal (almost three times higher than the cliffs of Moher at 1,972 feet!). Some of the most beautiful beaches in the world can also be found along the way. The Wild Atlantic Way deserves weeks to explore it fully!

DAY TRIPS AND HALF-DAY TRIPS

Dublin is easily reached and explored in a day trip (although you might want to stay for more), as are Galway, Kerry, and Cork.

If by some small chance Limerick doesn't satisfy your shopping needs, the famous <u>Kildare Village</u> designer outlet is just an hour and a half from Limerick by car or by bus, boasting over 90 designer brands at discount prices.

If the city scene is more your style, it is good to know that Ireland's other top cities are easily accessible.

SPORTS SCENE

If rugby isn't your thing, the Limerick hurling team is one of the best in the country, and you can see them play in the Gaelic Grounds alongside almost 50,000 supporters. You can also see Limerick play soccer at Markets Field, and although not as popular as rugby or hurling, it still guarantees a great day out!
